Some people think that a sense of competition in children should be encouraged. Others believe that children who are taught to co-operate rather than compete more useful adults.

Discuss both these views and give your own opinion.

The importance of developing a sense of cooperation in children as <u>opposed</u> to encouraging them to compete is a frequent topic of <u>discussions</u>. To my mind, the most important issue for children is to acquire <u>skills</u> in communication and how to improve it effectively by <u>expanding</u> the collaboration skills.

To accomplish this aim teachers along with parents should <u>sow the seeds of seed the</u> sharing, compassion and empathy in their innocent minds. Moreover, teachers have to teach them to develop peaceful <u>manners</u> with their peer students based on team working. They also should <u>be taught have taught</u> to <u>working</u> hard for the mutual benefits <u>all together altogether</u> by teachers.

Although although competition motivates both adults and children and more importantly it pushes them to do well, if winning still means that the other person loses, it would be undoubtedly wrong. Sometimes children have been are pushed by their parents to win despite themselves. Parents have to consider that not only should they not nurture the children to be egocentric, but they also have to teach them that there are others around them.

To sum up, it is almost impossible to separate these two <u>aspects/parts/sides strands</u> of our lives. In my view we need to develop a win-win attitude, <u>. Furthermore</u>, we need to be <u>not only</u> true <u>to with</u> ourselves and what we need, but also <u>thinking</u> about the other <u>person's people's</u> needs. If we can help our children to do this, we will be doing future generations a huge service/favor.
