Every year several languages die out. Some people think that this is not important because life will be easier if there are fewer languages in the world. To what extent do you agree or disagree with this opinion?

These days the death process of languages <u>are_is</u> accelerated by some factors like globalization and every years some languages become extinct forever. However, some people not only <u>do</u>-play down this disaster but also believe that the world would be <u>a</u> better place with a single language. This essay tries to convince these people that the easiest ways are not necessarily the safest ones.

Primarily, the extinction of <u>a</u> language has significant effects on <u>that</u>/a community's culture and traditions. The culture and language have a strong correlation and by losing a language, people will virtually lose some aspects of their culture and traditions like songs, myths and poetries that are not easily transferred to other languages.
