In addition, the future of their children might suffer unless they grew up with a profound understanding of the new culture and language. For example, if emigrant families' children aimed to apply and study for a decent university, not only would they need to be equipped with advanced language proficiency, but also they should be capable of interacting and socializing with people as a colleague or classmate.

In conclusion, although coping with a new culture might be both challenging and demanding for many people who have moved to a new country, I am holding on to the view that it would be more beneficial for them to adapt.
