Every year several languages die out. Some people think that this is not important because life will be easier if there are fewer languages in the world.

Due to globalization we have seen a dramatic decrease in the number of languages throughout the world. While there are valid arguments to the contrary, I personally believe that every nation should attempt to preserve its language as it is an important part of its culture.
